



# Development and Evaluation of Electronic Health Records Systems in Ethiopian Rural Primary Care Centers, 2003

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## Abstract

In Ethiopia, rural primary care centers face challenges in managing patient health records due to limited resources and traditional manual methods. A mixed-methods approach was employed, including surveys of healthcare providers, observations at selected centers, and analysis of EHR system implementation data. The EHR system showed a significant improvement in record accuracy (95% confidence interval: 0.87-0.96) compared to manual methods, reducing errors by 43%. User satisfaction scores averaged 82 out of 100. Despite technical and infrastructure challenges, the EHR system demonstrated potential in enhancing healthcare service quality and sustainability in rural settings.
