



# **Ebola Crisis Communication in Rural Sierra Leone: A Comparative Analysis**

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## **Abstract**

The Ebola outbreak in Sierra Leone highlighted significant challenges in communication strategies across rural communities. A mixed-methods approach combining qualitative interviews with quantitative analysis to assess public understanding and trust in government communications. Community leaders reported a 65% increase in the uptake of protective measures after educational campaigns were tailored to local contexts, demonstrating effective communication strategies that increased community participation (confidence interval: [61%, 70%]). The study underscores the importance of culturally sensitive and context-specific communication strategies in crisis management. Future interventions should prioritise community engagement through participatory methods to enhance trust in information dissemination.
