Abstract

In Mozambique's Zambezi Valley, women farmers face significant challenges in accessing credit and financing for their agricultural operations. A theoretical framework is proposed to guide future research and policy interventions aimed at enhancing women farmers' access to finance. Policy makers should consider supporting the formation of farmer-led cooperatives as a strategy for improving credit accessibility for women in Mozambique's agricultural sector.
