## Abstract

Southern Africa's traditional governance structures have coexisted alongside modern democratic processes for decades. This study aims to explore and compare these two systems in Ethiopia. Governments should develop strategies to enhance dialogue between traditional leaders and elected officials, fostering mutual respect and collaborative problem-solving.
