| Abstract

This study addresses a current research gap in Arts & Humanities concerning Public History and Memory-Making in Post-Conflict African Societies in Uganda. The objective is to clarify key debates, identify practical implications, and outline a focused agenda for scholarship and policy. A mixed-methods design was used, combining survey and interview data collected over the study period. The analysis indicates persistent structural constraints alongside emerging local innovations; however, evidence remains uneven across contexts and sectors.
