Abstract

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) is increasingly recognised as a critical component of business operations in various global contexts. A notable finding is that approximately 70% of MNCs in Angola have established CSR programmes, with environmental protection being the most prevalent theme across sectors. Given the significant adoption of CSR by MNCs in Angola, there is a need to develop more targeted regulatory frameworks that encourage comprehensive social impact assessments.
