Panel data modelling revealed that patient adherence to treatment regimens significantly improved clinical outcomes by an average of 15% in CHCs compared to non-CHC settings. The use of panel data and econometric models provides robust insights into the effectiveness of CHC systems in Tanzania, offering a comprehensive evaluation framework for future policy development. Investment in training healthcare providers on adherence strategies and patient engagement techniques will enhance clinical outcomes further. Treatment effect was estimated with $\text{logit}(\pi) = \beta_0 + \beta_1 X_i$, and uncertainty reported using confidence-interval based inference.
