## Abstract

Cultural adaptation and resilience are critical for migrant communities in Southern Africa, particularly those in South Africa. These communities face unique challenges such as language barriers, cultural differences, and socio-economic pressures. Recommendations include developing culturally sensitive policies and increasing access to resources that facilitate language preservation and intercultural understanding among migrant communities.
